NSW conditional registration

In my last Sidescreen article I said NSW conditional registration appears to be sorted and put to rest, until the next change is issued by the government. As it turns out it appears there has been a change from the government. In the past it was understood that only full financial members could use club registration in NSW. A review of the online government documents reveals that the only reference is to being a member of a suitable club.

This means Associate members can register a suitable car on club registration through the Register. The Register will retain the right to refuse to approve conditional registration for Associate members to avoid the club being inundated with people joining to gain access to club registration. The primary benefit will be for Associate members who are partners of Full members.

PRESIDENT'S Message

Website upgrade

The Committee have been working through what has proved to be a complex issue with respect to upgrading and operating our website. The current website was created nearly three decades ago and has served the club very well for a long time, primarily due to the effort and commitment of Rick Fletcher. Unfortunately, it is an old platform and is skill and time demanding for the people managing and updating it. It is imperative that we upgrade the website to a modern platform that can be managed and kept up to date by Ross McLeod with the support of a few members.

If we are unable to transfer the existing material over, we may just maintain the existing website as an archive of historical interest and use a new website with links between the two.

We have been fortunate that two members: Ian Wall and Colin Baldock; have stepped up to work with Ross to post stories, adverts, photos etc on the new website. Thank you Ian and Colin.

Paul Bingham - never at a loss for words - reports on the tribes and tribulations of driving to a TR Register Concours from Queensland.

We drove approximately 1,800km on the way to Merimbula - in and out of pot holes. It was great to meet up with Graeme and Tom on their maiden voyage in their newly restored TR3A from the Gold Coast. We then took them on a Magic Mystery Tour to Merimbula. Driving to some interesting places like Ebor Waterfalls in Guy Fawkes National Park and Wollomombi Waterfalls - the first time I have seen water flowing over them!

We visited Armidale for the first night, then Tamworth, Bob's Shed at Quirindi (what a collection!). Stayed a night in Singleton before meeting the rest of the Queensland Tribe. There were eight TRs: from Hervey Bay, Sunshine Coast, Brisbane and the Gold Coast. We met up near Bulga for the run to Merimbula organised by Greg and Judy, starting on the Putty Road all the way to Grassy Hill, Colo Heights, Bilpin, Mount Wilson, and Katoomba for the night. Always a great drive.

On to Canberra not straightforward as the Jenolan Caves' roads were flooded. We found out after crossing a couple of creeks with 100mm of water over them. At the 3rd creek crossing a worker said the water would be up to the doors if we went any further.

So a regroup and reschedule the route - just a bit of back TRacking to Lithgow then on to Bathurst, Oberon, Crookwell, Gunning then to Canberra (more details in Greg's report). We left Canberra on the Monaro Highway via Michelangelo, Bredbo and Cooma with a stop at the Snowy Mountain Hydro Discovery Centre. This was worth a visit to see what is happening with the Hydro System in NSW.

From the Monaro Highway to Nimmitabel, Bemboka, Bega, Wolumla, then Merimbula. What TRip in a TR! I think the ladies need a Medal to do this kind of TRip in these little cars called TRiumph Roadsters! What roadsters these cars are! What champions are these ladies - well done!

Triumphs Tour Valley

A group of sports car enthusiasts will be putting an estimated \$200,000 into the local economy when they visit the Bega Valley between October 13 - 20.

About 140 members of the TR-Register Australia will be visiting when they hold their annual get together and that means sports car lovers can expect to see two-door Triumph Roadsters driving around our towns and villages.

The TR (Triumph Roadster) Register Australia is a national club that was founded in 1976 and is dedicated to the preservation and use of the range of Triumph sports cars build from 1953 to 1962.

Since 1978, the club has held an annual concours and car display with the exception of the 2020 and 2021 events.

Merimbula was chosen for the 2022 event and national secretary of TR Register Australia Bob Watters, who lives at Tura Beach, said the response from members had been terrific with three motels fully booked and more rooms reserved in a fourth.

A full program of events will include car display at Ford Park Merimbula on Saturday October 15 from 9am until 2pm where members staying in Merimbula will be joined by Victorian and ACT club members for the day.

"We expect close to 100 cars will be on display on the Saturday," Mr Watters said.

On Sunday the cars will be on display again when visitors head to the Seahorse Inn, Boydtown for lunch.

On Saturday evening the members will hold a gala dinner at Club Sapphire. A raffle will be held where the main item will be a painting of a previous roadster owner by Mr Watters, by Nethercote artist Paul Dion (pictured below left).

"We always donate to a local charity and this year all proceeds from the raffle will be given to Pearl's Place [the social café in Pambula] because it's fully volunteered and runs on donations," Mr Watters said.

The group is also going whale watching while they are in Merimbula as well as taking over the Picture Show Man cinema for an evening.

"From October 17-19 we will do four drives going to different parts of the shire, Eden, Cobargo, Bermagui and Tathra. We're taking people everywhere to show how great it is," Mr Watters said.

He thanked Shannons Insurance for its support.

Love of vintage Triumphs

The Sapphire Coast put on its spring best to welcome Triumph drivers from across the country on Saturday.

Around 100 sportscars and their owners from the Tr Register Australia car club were at Ford Park Merimbula, showing off their vintage roadsters to a huge crown of appreciative onlookers.

Among the owners was John McCormack, president and a founding member of the club that boasts around 370 members.

He had driven from Leichardt Sydney in his glorious TR2 which he has faithfully restored with all original parts.

Mr McCormack said his love of the Triumph marque began in 1976, somewhat serendipitously.

"I'd had a bad surfing accident and almost died, so I thought I'd go out and buy a sports car, like any guy in their 20s would do."

"I put a deposit down on an Austin Healey and when we went into the city to collect it he had withdrawn it from sale."

"My then girlfriend saw across the road in another car yard, a green Triumph. We bought that and I've driven it ever since." In 2017, Mr McCormack then had the opportunity to purchase "two trailer loads of parts" for a TR2.

He has he invested around two years and \$69,000 getting the rare model back on the road and in the condition admirers enjoyed on the weekend.

Also, taking a close look at the Triumphs on display was Noel Schmidt from South Australia.

He was one of the judges checking out the various vehicles and their restorations, or in some cases their modern additions.

He said the "modified" category included Triumphs that had power brakes, power steering, or electronic ignition installed, among other conveniences not found in the originals from the 1950s.

"I restored mine in 2010 and have won four of these."

"But I didn't bring it this time - I was too scared to bring it with the weather predictions and the state of the NSW roads!"

More important however, was getting together with fellow drivers and members of the TR Register Australia.

"You only see them once or twice a year so it's really good to catch up like this."

Water crossings were interesting ... you can't break these dear little TRs.

Canberra stopover

We were in Canberra for 2 days with Ken organising a most interesting guided tour of the National War Museum. The afternoon was taken up with the flowers of Floriade, then on to Merimbula on Thursday. We checkrf in, had a few drinks then off to the Welcome dinner which was enjoyed by all especially after three years of COVID.

These first dinners are so special and set the scene for a terrific week of TR-ing festivities. Little did I know what was in store for me. Friday was another terrific day looking over the Eden Whale Museum, lunch with Ian and Sue McLeish, then onto Pambula for the Boys' Shed vehicle display including the guided tour. The day was fabulous.

They raced up to the motel, diagnosing a heart attack, which I didn't want to hear (only older people have heart attacks and some die). Was this going to happen to me? With my mind running wild - I'm too young to be taken - heaven may be a better place but there won't be any Triumph fun!

The ambulance/paramedics took quite a while and so I appreciated Lewis and Carol's professional consoling treatment while Gail and our son Clinton did their best to love me through pain, keeping me sane.

Emergency services

The Ambulance trip was at 110kmh dodging pot holes, kangaroos and more pot holes. Gail was in the front and the best paramedic in the world was treating me. The interesting part was that after much medication they had this special brew they called Draino. After the explanation of what the side effects could be (bleeding through every orifice in your body?!?) I signed off on having it injected. The Elephant jumped off my chest and I felt like I could jump out and run. After visiting Bega and Cooma hospitals at 1am, the Canberra cardiologist wanted me there. The Ambos had been working almost all day and night we so we waited a few hours for an ambulance to arrive from Canberra, getting us there at 5.30am Saturday, the day of the Concours. They don't operate radiology machinery on weekends, so I ended up having an angiogram and another stent Monday morning. Feeling almost normal again was a moment for appreciating modern medical technology and medicine.

Aren't we all just so fortunate to live in this great southern land with all its beauty, around every corner? We've experienced a lot of it during our TR travels with friends.

Lewis and Ian organised the driving of Byron to Canberra where I had organised for it to be transported home. It arrived last week after being through every rain and dust storm. It's all in one piece and after a clean-up grease, it's a pleasure to drive. It still did 1600 miles in spite of missing all the driving events and those special times that one experiences being a member of the TR Register.

We are overwhelmed with the kindness shown from members during and post this adventure. I trust my experience will never be repeated with any of you especially during a TR event.

Heart health

One thing I've learnt is that no matter how fit you believe you are, living a life in balance, eating the right foods and doing all in moderation is vital. You never know what's around the corner.

To be sure of just how well your heart and its blood supply system is running, the CT angiogram is now the preferred diagnosis of heart and artery disease. Just a thought.

A couple of months later, I noticed coolant on the bell housing and thought it was time to replace the gasket. I sourced a very expensive, Racetorations gasket and thought that would sort everything. I fitted it and took the car for a run to the Beaumaris Car Show and everything was fine.

A couple days later, I noticed coolant on the bell housing! You can just imagine my pleasure at that sight! Off with the head and replaced the welch plug. All good.

I bought ARP head studs to ensure the job was finally done correctly. A couple of the studs put up a huge fight. One took me three days to remove. Finally, I used one of the cam-type stud tools and my torque wrench. There is a "but ..." at this point. One of the studs had broken in service. Of course, one of the long ones and the break was four inches below the block!! Keith Brown came over and helped me drill out the remaining stud. Then a battle to tap the thread four inches down a hole followed. It was quite stressful torquing down the head at that point but it held at 100 foot pounds. Still good.

I then had trouble getting it to run smoothly and asked Stuart West for help. This was AFL Grand Final morning and we were fiddling about with carbies and timing when the head gasket let go, filling his shed with white smoke. Bugger!

Stuart removed the head and had it machined for me, before calling me on Thursday to say it was all back together.

The following Friday and Saturday, Stuart battled on trying to get it sorted, before discovering the choke partially on. That problem out of the way, it ran well and we took it for a run. Perfect.

With a week or so before Merimbula and not a lot of confidence in the TR3A because it had few kilometres on the road, we decided to take the TR6! It had a new clutch, the metering unit was sorted and it was running well ... or so I thought!

The trip to Merimbula was event-free, except for getting 18mpg. The plugs were fouling and it sounded like the choke was on.

You possibly noticed the bonnet up every day, as we chased every clue for a solution. Finally on Tuesday, I had a manifold vacuum test which showed 17 inches of Hg. It should be about seven inches. This would cause too much fuel to be sucked in to the injectors!! The solution was to advance the timing and the car certainly ran much better.

It ran really well to Bairnsdale at 100kph. Then on start-up, ran rough. By Stratford, there was coolant spraying around the engine bay. More of that sealant gunk and when checked ten minutes later in Sale, there were no leaks.

It still ran rough and we decided to limp along to my parents' house in Moe. From there, we took their car and drove home. It was so relaxing in a Commodore!

Thursday morning, we headed back to Moe with a car trailer. Jenny drove the Commodore while COVID positive but we figured she would not have contact with anyone.

Because the car would not run, I had to winch it onto the trailer. With about one foot to go, I decided to give the car a final push ... and snapped my left Achilles tendon!!

Jenny will attest that I did not swear ... much. No really bad words anyway. We finished loading the car and strapping it down, then headed back to Mornington, to drop the car and trailer.

From there, we headed to our house for a shower and a change of clothes and on to the Emergency Department at Peninsula Private. A couple of hours later, I was in plaster, hoping to avoid surgery. We should know in a few weeks.

The funny thing is, 20 October 2022 is nine years to the day I snapped my right Achilles tendon while avoiding a snake at golf!!

Jenny has cold like symptoms and I tested negative again. How does that work, really?!! If you feel inclined to take a run at the MOSS award, I have pity on you. It will not be a nice outcome should you win!

With the small number of sidescreen TRs on the island, cars are either sold to the mainland or are bought and brought into Tasmania. Sometimes it is known where they end up and sometimes they are lost.

I recalled going to Devonport at the turn of the century with John Baker to look at a similar TR3A which was for sale. It had a gaping gap in the bottom right hand corner of the boot lid. Peter confirmed this. He had rectified the fault. Peter purchased the car in Newcastle more recently. In the April/May 1999 *Sidescreen* issue, Chris Auty had a for sale advertisement for the car with a price tag of \$14,000. The following issue indicated it had been sold.

Whilst passing through Melbourne on the way home I took the opportunity to catch up with two other Peerless GT owners:

- Jeff Leech a TR Register member and
- Trevor Burke who owns the ex Bob Cutting car which is on the TR Register website Gallery page

Jeff's original car has had an ongoing restoration for a number of years and is almost complete save for a small amount of interior trim. It has had a remarkable transformation from its yellow paint to its silver livery highlighted with 72 spoke chrome wires and front calipers and rear drums painted yellow. Additionally the bumperettes have been chromed to good effect whereas originally aluminium oxide was added to the fiberglass from which the bumperettes were moulded: a bit like silverfrost.

Jeff also has a second Peerless GT undergoing a rebuild being the ex Laurie/Richard King car out of WA. I reported on this after the Ballarat Concours

My own Peerless GT has now returned home after the engine rebuild. There was a few weeks delay in getting the head back after having larger valves and new guides fitted. I need to paint the floor before refitting the carpet and seats. We also took the opportunity to rebuild the steering box.





Our cars

They got as far as Moonah, just north of Hobart when Stephen decided he couldn't keep pumping the brakes all the way and so it was a quick turn around back home to get Ginetta's Mazda MX-5 out for the trip and making it to Devonport on time.

It was a fairly long time in the queue at the ferry terminal which Martin's TR3A didn't like and was close to a boil. Hugh's TR2 was the first of our cars on board and he was directed to park on a sloping ramp. He wasn't sure that the handbrake would hold so asked the controller if he could be moved to a level area because his handbrake didn't work. The controller could see the next 3 TRs and said "And, I suppose the handbrakes are no good on these other Triumphs too" to which I said "that's right, and why they call them "fly-off handbrakes". So we all parked on the level.

Straight off the ferry, Martin had to top up his car with coolant resulting from the overheating the night before. After that we all had a trouble free run to Merimbula. The primrose TR3A was having a bit of pinking going on so Bob Anderson retarded it a bit and suggested that I add some octane booster which seemed to have stopped the problem.

Just before Sale, John Kay was having issue with his overdrive switch which wouldn't come out of overdrive. Meanwhile back at home Winston Quaile has been to see my TR3A to check on the placement of some of the ancillaries under the bonnet. I hope that this summer his car will hit the road.


